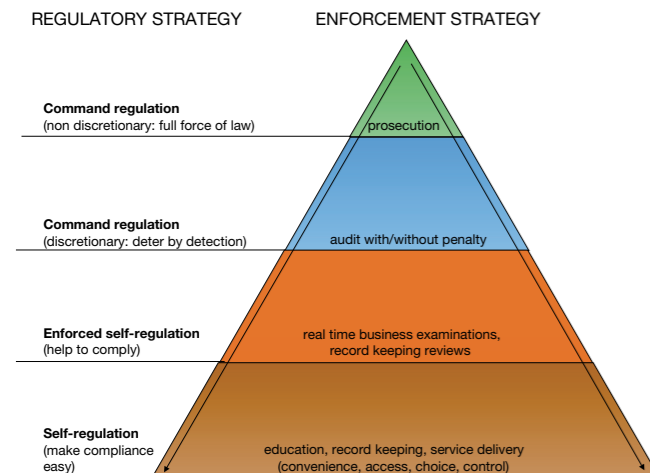
The regulatory studies programs will be taught by leading academics, including:

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Regulatory studies

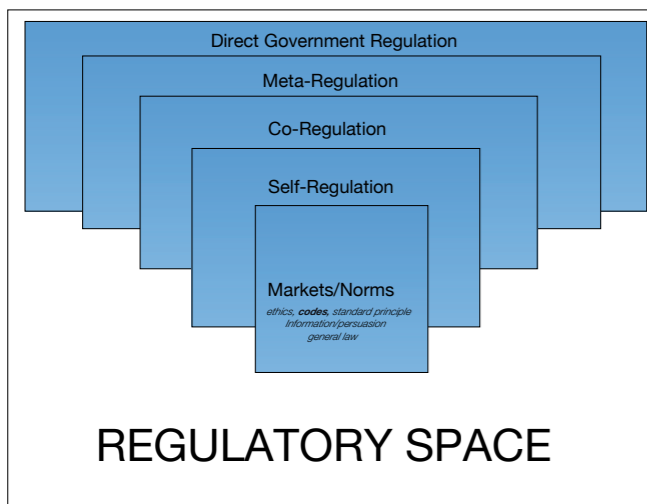
The regulatory sector at a national and international level is extensive and complex, but the study of regulation is a relatively new discipline.

Monash University established the Centre for Regulatory Studies in order to extend the boundaries of interdisciplinary studies in a joint initiative between the Faculties of Law, Business and Economics, Arts, Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences, and Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences.

The centre has developed a comprehensive and flexible postgraduate program specifically designed to address the nature, extent and implications of the regulatory environment in a broad, cross-disciplinary approach.

The objectives of the regulatory studies programs are:

- To provide a broad understanding of theory, practice, processes and techniques across a range of regulatory activities.
- To provide current and future practitioners with relevant theories and skills to manage regulatory challenges arising in Australia and internationally.
- To provide an understanding of law, economics, public policy and public administration for professionals working in regulation, regulatory affairs, government relations and compliance.

The Monash Centre for Regulatory Studies aims to provide a better understanding of the various forces that comprise contemporary regulation. Regulation may be local, national, international and, indeed, global in its effects. Regulation is much more than an instrument of public policy.

There is a need for teaching programs that provide professionals in the regulatory sector with a core set of ideas, theories and skills to apply to their activities. Monash University’s Centre for Regulatory Studies offers innovative programs to address this need, with postgraduate courses and single unit enrolments.

Graduate Diploma in Regulatory Studies

The Graduate Diploma in Regulatory Studies is available to graduates from any discipline. The course comprises eight units – the equivalent of one year full-time or up to two years part-time study. Credit may be given for prior learning.

Single unit enrolments

Any of the units in the regulatory studies program can be undertaken as a single unit enrolment. This option is available to graduates from any discipline, or those with qualifications and experience determined to be suitable preparation.

Single units can be completed as assessed or non-assessed subjects. Students who complete assessment may seek credit for that unit towards a masters or graduate diploma degree.

Course structure – Master of Regulatory Studies

Students must complete three core units. Remaining units may be chosen from the list of elective units below:
