Law (Bachelors) Resolutions 2001

Resolutions of the Law Faculty Board pursuant to the Faculty of Law regulations

Bachelors degrees

1. Faculty information handout

The faculty information handout consisting of the Faculty of Law regulations and these resolutions shall be made available on-line at the faculty of law web page and a copy shall be available for consultation at the student administration office at the faculty. (*Regulation 2.1*)

2. Completion of a unit

2. A candidate completes a unit when the board of examiners or the dean after taking into account his or her performance:

2.1 in the unit examination for that unit;

2.2 in lectures, seminars and tutorials specified as part of that unit; and

2.3 in written or oral work specified as part of that unit; is satisfied that he or she has attained at least a pass standard. (Formerly *Regulation 7*)

3. Unit examinations

Pursuant to the 'Examinations regulations' the dean may, in his or her discretion, determine that there shall be no unit examination in a unit. (Formerly *Regulation 8*)

4. Power to refuse admission to unit examinations

4.1 For the purposes of this resolution, the dean may specify as a requirement of a unit one or more of the following:

4.1.1 attendance at lectures;

4.1.2 attendance at seminars;

4.1.3 attendance at tutorials;

4.1.4 completion of written or oral work.

4.2 Where a candidate has not complied with the requirements of a unit specified by the dean pursuant to resolution 4.1, the dean may, in his or her discretion, refuse to admit the candidate

to the unit examination for that unit. (Formerly *Regulation 9*)

5. Classification of candidate's work

5.1 When a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Laws successfully completes a unit, the examiners shall classify the candidate's work into one of the following grades: high distinction (HD); distinction (D); credit (C); pass (P).

5.2 A candidate who fails to successfully complete a unit shall be given the grade of fail (N). (Formerly *Regulation 13*)

~~Full-time and part-time candidates~~ [Formerly *Regulation 15*, see now *Regulation 6*]

~~Time limits~~ [Formerly *Regulation 16.1*, see now *Regulation 7*]

6. Calculation of time limits

6.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary appearing in Faculty of Law regulations section 7, where a candidate is credited with a unit towards his or her course the maximum period within which he or she is required to complete his course shall be reduced by a period of three months for each unit so credited. For the purpose of this subsection:

6.1.1 a unit which represents twelve and a half per centum of a normal workload of a full-time candidate for a year, shall be regarded as one unit, and

6.1.2 a unit which represents more or less than twelve and a half per centum of a normal workload of a full-time candidate for a year shall be regarded as more or less than one unit to an extent proportionate to the ratio which the percentage it represents bears to twelve and a half per centum. (Formerly *Regulation 16.2*)

6.2. For the purposes of section 7, the period of candidature shall be calculated from the date on which the candidate is first enrolled in the faculty as a candidate provided that, in the case of a candidate enrolled in more than one faculty, the period shall be calculated from the date on which he or she first enrolled in the other faculty. (Formerly *Regulation 17*)

7. Prerequisites of candidature

The dean may, in his or her discretion, recommend that a person be admitted to a law degree referred to in this part notwithstanding that the person was not a candidate for that degree when he or she completed each unit for that degree. (Formerly *Regulation 18*)

8. Unit requirements – a candidate other than a candidate enrolled in more than one faculty

8.1 Subject to these resolutions, a candidate other than a candidate enrolled in more than one faculty shall, if a candidate with a prior qualification, qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Laws upon complying with the requirements of resolution 8.2.

8.2 A candidate, other than a candidate enrolled in more than one faculty, must complete law units available in the faculty to which the board has attributed a total value of 156 credit points which unit shall include elective units and -

8.2.1 Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A, Contract B, Torts A, Torts B, Constitutional law, Criminal law and procedure, A, Criminal law B Property A, Property B, Administrative law.

8.3 Subject to these resolutions, a candidate other than a candidate enrolled in more than one faculty shall, if not a candidate with a prior qualification, qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Laws upon complying with the requirements of resolution 8.2 (save that the total value of credit points shall be 192). (Formerly *Regulation 26*)

9. Unit requirements – a candidate enrolled in more than one faculty

9. A candidate enrolled in more than one faculty shall:

9.1 qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Aerospace Engineering, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Biomedical Science, Bachelor of Business (Banking and Finance), Bachelor of Business (Management), Bachelor of Business Systems, Bachelor of Commerce, Bachelor of Computer Science, Bachelor of Economics, Bachelor of Education, Bachelor of Engineering, Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Performing Arts, Bachelor of Science, Diploma of Psychology, or such other bachelor's degree or diploma as the board may from time to time approve;

9.2 Subject to resolution 9.2.2 complete (while a candidate for one of the degrees referred to in the preceding resolution or subsequently) law units available in the faculty to which the board has attributed a total value of 156 credit points which units shall include elective units and those in 9.2.1 -

9.2.1-Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A, Contract B, Torts A, Torts B; Constitutional law; Criminal law and procedure A, Criminal law B; Property A, Property B, Administrative law.

9.2.2 In the case of a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Medicine/Bachelor of Surgery or

Bachelor of Education the total value of law units required to be completed shall be 144 credit points. (Formerly *Regulation 27*)

10. The degree – pass or with honours

10.1 For the purpose of making a determination under Faculty of Law regulations section 10, the dean must -

10.1.1 have regard to the candidate's performance in all units offered by the faculty and undertaken by the candidate towards the degree; and

10.1.2 in respect of a candidate who has satisfactorily completed Honours research subject 512 [LAW5207] add a bonus of 20 percent to the mark obtained by the candidate in that unit. (Formerly *Regulation 29*)

11. Classification - Bachelor of Laws with honours

The degree of Bachelor of Laws with honours must be classified as Class 1, Class II Division A, Class II Division B or Class III. (Formerly *Regulation 29*)

12. Unit sequence

The normal full-time workload is forty-eight points per year.

The normal sequence in which units are undertaken in each of the courses offered by the Faculty of Law is set out below.

LLB (3 year)

12.1 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Laws under section 26.2.1 of the Faculty of Law regulations, shall enrol:

12.1.1 in the first year of enrolment for Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A, Contract B, Torts A, Torts B, Criminal law and procedure A, Criminal law B;

12.1.2 in the second year of enrolment for Property A, Property B, Constitutional law, and thirty-six points elective law units;

12.1.3 in the third year of enrolment for Administrative law and forty-eight points elective law units.

LLB (4 year)

12.2 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Laws under section 26.3 of the Faculty of Law regulations, shall enrol:

12.2.1 in the first year of enrolment in Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A, Contract B, Criminal law and procedure A, Criminal law B and twelve points elective units.

12.2.2 in the second year of enrolment in Property A, Property B, Constitutional law, Torts A, Torts B and eighteen points elective law units.

12.2.3 in the third year of enrolment in forty-eight points elective law units.

12.2.4 in the fourth year of enrolment in Administrative law, and forty-two points elective law units .

BA/LLB

12.3 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.3.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling twenty-four points, Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A and Contract B;

12.3.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling forty-two points, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B;

12.3.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty points, Torts A, Torts B, Property A and Property B;

12.3.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Constitutional law, and forty-two points elective law units; and

12.3.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law and forty-two points elective law units.

BBus(Bkg&Fin)/LLB

12.4 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Business (Banking and Finance) and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.4.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling twenty-four points, Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A and Contract B;

12.4.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling forty-two points, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B;

12.4.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points Property A and Property B;

12.4.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Torts A, Torts B, law, and thirty-six points elective law units; and

12.4.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law, and forty-eight points elective law units.

BCom/LLB

12.5 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.5.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling twenty-four points, Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A and Contract B;

12.5.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Property A and Property B;

12.5.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points Equity, Corporations law and six points elective law units;

12.5.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Criminal law and procedure A, Criminal law B, Torts A, Torts B, Constitutional law, and eighteen points elective law units; and

12.5.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law, and forty-eight points elective law units.

BCompSc/LLB

12.6 Except with the approval of the Dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Computer Science and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol

12.6.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling 24 points, Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A and Contract B;

12.6.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling forty-two points, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B;

12.6.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling forty-two points and Property A and Property B;

12.6.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Torts A, Torts B, Constitutional law, and thirty-six points elective law units;

12.6.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law and forty-eight points elective law units.

BE/LLB

12.7 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Engineering (Chemical) and Bachelor of Laws, Bachelor of Engineering (Civil) and Bachelor of Laws, Bachelor of Engineering (Electrical and Computer Systems Engineering) 1/05 and Bachelor of Laws, Bachelor of Engineering (Industrial Engineering and Engineering Management) and Bachelor of Laws, Bachelor of Engineering (Materials) and Bachelor of Laws

or Bachelor of Engineering (Mechanical) and Bachelor of Laws, Bachelor of Engineering (Mechatronics) and Bachelor of Laws (3/04) shall enrol:

12.7.1 in the first year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering, Introduction to legal reasoning and Research and writing;

12.7.2 in the second year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering;

12.7.3 in the third year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering, Contract A and Contract B;

12.7.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering, Torts A, Torts B, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B;

12.7.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Property A, Property B, Constitutional law and thirty-six points elective law units; and

12.7.6 in the sixth year of enrolment for Administrative law, and forty-eight points elective law units.

BMus/LLB

12.8 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.8.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Introduction to legal reasoning and Research and writing;

12.8.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Contract A and Contract B;

12.8.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty points, Torts A, Torts B, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B;

12.8.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Property A, Property B, Constitutional law, and thirty-six points elective law units; and

12.8.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law, and forty-eight points elective law units.

BPA/LLB

12.9 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Performing Arts and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.13.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling twenty-four points, Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing, Contract A and Contract B;

12.9.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B;

12.9.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Property A and Property B

12.9.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Torts A, Torts B, Constitutional law, and thirty-six points of elective law units; and

12.9.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law, and forty-eight points elective law units.

BSc/LLB

12.10 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.10.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Introduction to legal reasoning and Research and writing;

12.10.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Contract A and Contract B;

12.10.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling twenty-four points, Torts A, Torts B, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B

12.10.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Property A, Property B, Constitutional law and thirty-six points elective law units; and

12.10.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law and forty-eight points elective law units.

12.11 Except with the approval of the dean, a candidate for the degrees of Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.11.1 in the first year of enrolment for forty-eight points non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences;

12.11.2 in the second year of enrolment for Introduction to legal reasoning, Research and writing and such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences;

12.11.3 in the third year of enrolment for Contract A, Contract B, Criminal law and procedure A, Criminal law B, Torts A, Torts B and eighteen points elective law units;

12.11.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Property A, Property B and such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences;

12.11.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for twelve points elective law units and such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences;

12.11.6 in the sixth year of enrolment for Administrative law, Constitutional law and such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences;

12.11.7 in the seventh year of enrolment for forty-two points elective law units.

B BiomedSc/LLB

12.12 Except with the approval of the Dean, a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Biomedical Science and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.12.1 in the first year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Introduction to legal reasoning and Research and writing;

12.12.2 in the second year of enrolment for non-law units totalling thirty-six points, Contract A and Contract B;

12.12.3 in the third year of enrolment for non-law units totalling twenty-four points, Criminal law and procedure A, Criminal law B, Torts A and Torts B;

12.12.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for Property A, Property B, Constitutional law and thirty-six points elective law units;

12.12.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Administrative law and forty-eight points elective law units.

BAeroEng/LLB

12.13 Except with the approval of the Dean, a candidate for the Bachelor of Aerospace Engineering and Bachelor of Laws shall enrol:

12.13.1 in the first year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering, Introduction to legal reasoning and Research and writing;

12.13.2 in the second year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering, Contract A and Contract B;

12.13.3 in the third year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering, Criminal law and procedure A and Criminal law B;

12.13.4 in the fourth year of enrolment for such non-law units as are required by the Faculty of Engineering, Property A and Property B;

12.13.5 in the fifth year of enrolment for Torts A, Torts B and forty-two points elective law units;

12.13.6 in the sixth year of enrolment for Administrative law, Constitutional law and forty-two points elective law units.

13. Compulsory units

The compulsory units specified in resolutions 8.2.1 and 9.2.1 above, shall be attributed the credit point values as listed in table 1;

14. Elective units

14.1 the elective units available in the faculty shall be the units listed in table 2;

14.2 each such unit shall be taught over the period set out in the table;

14.3 the points to be attributed to each elective unit shall be as set out in the table.

14.4 the research subject and units referred to in the table require individual research under supervision. Each research subject or unit will need individual approval and no research subject or unit will be approved unless a suitably qualified member of staff is available with adequate time to supervise the research. The research involved will normally take place over a period of not less than three calendar months and not more than twelve calendar months. The points attributed to the research subject or unit shall be either six or twelve according to the work involved.

17. Honours classification and order of merit

17.1 The Honours Weighted Average is the average of the weighted percentage grades awarded to a candidate in each law unit taken in the Faculty as part of his or her course for the degree of Bachelor of Laws.

17.2 A bonus of 20 per cent will be applied to the mark obtained in 'Honours research subject 512' [LAW5207]. This bonus will apply solely for the purpose of calculating the Honours Weighted Average.

17.3 A student may not enrol in 'Honours research unit 512' [LAW5207] without the consent of the Director, Honours Program to the enrolment and to the proposed research topic.

17.4 The award of honours to a candidate in a particular class, and the candidate's place in the order of merit for the year of his or her completion, will be determined solely by reference to the candidates's Honours Weighted Average and this resolution.

17.5 A candidate will be awarded honours in the classes H1, H2A, H2B and H3 as the case may be where the candidate's Honours Weighted Average falls precisely within the numeric ranges specified in Table 5.

17.6 In February of each year, or as soon as practicable thereafter, a list will be prepared of all candidates who have completed all the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Laws in the preceding academic year (including candidates who have just completed as a result of supplementary or special (deferred) examinations). This list of candidates shall be arranged in order of merit and show the class of honours (if any) awarded to each listed candidate.

17.7 A candidate will only be eligible for inclusion in the order of merit list upon completion of the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Laws.

18. Credit points required for exchange programs

18.1 The minimum requirement for Law students to be eligible to participate in exchange programs is completion of 72 credit points in courses listed in s12 of these Resolutions which will include 48 credit points of compulsory or quasi compulsory Law units from the Bachelor of Laws.

18.2 Except where the Associate Dean (Undergraduate) in any particular case determines otherwise, the minimum requirements for a student to be eligible to participate in the faculty's Prato and Malaysia study programs are that the student

18.2.1 has completed 48 credit points of law units, and

18.2.2 has achieved a minimum average mark of 55% in all law units actually completed.

19. Admission requirements

19.1 Monash University Foundation Year

The minimum entry requirements to the Bachelor of Laws for students who have completed the Monash University Foundation Year is a score of 320.

20. Board of Examiners

20.1 Pursuant to *section 7.4* of the University Examinations Regulations, the Board of Examiners is divided into sections, each with authority to determine results in particular units or groups of units.

20.2 Undergraduate Section of the Board of Examiners comprises:

- 20.2.1 the Associate Dean (Undergraduate Studies) who shall be *ex officio* chair;
- 20.2.2 two chief examiners of undergraduate units offered in the semester that the board meets (nominated by the Dean);
- 20.2.3 the Faculty Manager or nominee;
- 20.2.4 any chief examiner who has not submitted appropriately completed results, verification report and Faculty of Law Quality Assurance Questionnaire prior to the printing of the Register of Results in the semester that the board meets;

20.3 Authority to determine whether a candidate may sit for particular supplementary or special examinations for undergraduate units has been delegated by Faculty Board (at its Meeting 3/2005) to a Special Consideration Panel.

21. Supplementary examination resolutions

Pursuant to *section 4.1* of the University Examinations Regulations:

21.1 Definitions:

- 'student' means a person who is enrolled as a candidate for a Bachelor of Laws degree of the faculty;
- 'final semester' includes the summer semester of that academic year;
- 'board of examiners' means undergraduate division of the board of examiners

21.2 Compulsory units eligible for supplementary examinations are:

LAW2101 Contract A
LAW2102 Contract B
LAW2201 Torts A
LAW2202 Torts B
LAW3301 Criminal law and procedure A
LAW3302 Criminal law B
LAW3401 Property A
LAW3402 Property B

21.3 No supplementary examination shall be awarded other than in accordance with these rules.

21.4 A supplementary examination in a unit may involve a student in repeating all or part of the course of study in that unit.

21.5 The maximum mark for a unit which can be earned at a supplementary examination is 50% (Pass).

21.6 A student who has sat a special examination in relation to a unit and has failed to pass that unit is not eligible for a supplementary examination in relation to the current enrolment in that unit unless it is the last unit required to qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Laws and the requirements of *s21.9* are satisfied.

21.7 A student who has been permitted to sit for a supplementary examination in relation to a unit shall present for that examination during the university's supplementary and special examination period as prescribed under the *Examination Regulations*, section 4.2, or as otherwise directed by the Associate Dean

(Undergraduate Studies) or the Chief Examiner in the unit and is not entitled to any deferment of that examination or special examination in relation to that unit.

21.8 Transitional Supplementary Examination

21.8.1 Subject to *s21.9* where a student has failed to pass a unit, the Associate Dean (Undergraduate Studies) or the Board of Examiners shall permit the student to sit for a supplementary examination in that unit, provided:

- 21.8.1.1 the unit is a specified compulsory unit for the degree of Bachelor of Laws; and
- 21.8.1.2 the student obtained a final mark of not less than 45% in that unit;
- 21.8.1.3 the student is in their first year of law studies at any university or has completed less than 30 credit points (or equivalent) of law units in a double degree with law at any university; and
- 21.8.1.4 the student has not previously sat for a supplementary examination in a law unit.

21.9 Final Unit Supplementary Examination

21.9.1 Where a student is enrolled as a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Laws and has failed a unit in the final semester of that course and:

- 21.9.1.1 has passed all other units required to qualify for that degree; and
- 21.9.1.2 has not in that semester been granted a supplementary examination under *s21.8*

shall upon application to the Associate Dean (Undergraduate Studies) within fourteen days of the publication of the results in that unit be permitted to sit a supplementary examination in that unit.

21.10 Conditional Supplementary Examination

21.10.1 A student who is enrolled as a candidate in the degree of the Bachelor of Laws in the penultimate semester of the final year of that course and:

- 21.10.1.1 has failed a compulsory or quasi-compulsory unit in that semester;
- 21.10.1.2 the failed unit is not offered in the following (final) semester of the student's degree; and
- 21.10.1.3 has not, during the penultimate semester been granted a supplementary examination under *s21.8* of these resolutions

shall upon application to the Associate Dean (Undergraduate Studies) within fourteen days of the publication of the results in that unit be permitted to sit a supplementary examination in that unit in the next available special and supplementary examination period.

21.10.2 Where a student successfully completes the supplementary examination specified in 21.10.1, the result will be withheld until all units are completed successfully in the final semester of the course. The final results awarded for successful supplementary examination result is 50 (Pass).

21.10.3 Where a student has not successfully completed the remaining units in the following (final) semester of the degree, the withheld result for the supplementary examination will be void and the student will be required to repeat the failed unit in the next available teaching period where that unit is offered.

22. Special consideration and deferred examination resolutions

Resolution 22 is under review pending imminent release of new University Special Consideration policy and procedures on Special Consideration

Pursuant to *s 3 and s7* of the University Examinations Regulations:

22.1 Special consideration for a final examination in a unit

22.1.1. Applications for special consideration shall be made by lodging them at the Student Services

counter, Building 12, Clayton Campus or, by any other means specified on the Student Services website relating to special consideration.

22.1.2 The Associate Dean (Undergraduate Studies) may accept a late application for special consideration for a final examination in exceptional circumstances where the Associate Dean is satisfied that a student was, due to circumstances beyond their control, unable to make an application by the required date,

22.1.3 Late applications for special consideration will not under any circumstances be accepted after the results in the unit have been formally published by the university.

22.1.4 The Manager, Student and Academic Services and the Manager, Examinations and Student Progression or nominee shall make an initial assessment of special consideration applications and make a recommendation to the Board of Examiners as to the outcome of the application.

22.2 Determining applications for special consideration

22.2.1 The Special Consideration Panel shall comprise the persons from time to time holding the offices of Associate Dean (Undergraduate), the Manager, Student and Academic Services and the Deputy Manager (Student and Academic Services, Clayton) respectively.

22.2.2 The Special Consideration Panel shall determine whether to grant applications for special consideration:

22.2.2.1 for an 'early' approval of deferred examination, where a complete application with supporting documentation is made no later than 5 University working days before the final examination for which special consideration is sought; and

22.2.2.2 where a teaching faculty has made a recommendation under paragraph 5.5 of the Special Consideration Procedures.

22.2.3 The Special Consideration Panel shall make an initial assessment of end of semester application for special consideration and shall make a recommendation to the Board of Examiners as to the outcome of the application.

22.2.4 Where the Special Consideration Panel or the Board of Examiners grants special consideration in relation to a final examination, the only form of special consideration that may be provided is the grant of a deferred examination.

22.2.5 Applications for special consideration for in-semester assessment shall be determined by the Chief Examiner of the unit concerned. The Chief Examiner of the unit shall determine the form that the special consideration will take, provided that a mark adjustment shall not be made in any circumstances.

22.2.6 A Chief Examiner may grant an extension, not exceeding two working days, of the time for submission of an in-semester assessment task (excluding class tests) on receipt of an application for short extension signed by the student on a form specified for that purpose by the Manager, Student and Academic Services, and must notify the student of the decision and keep a record.

22.3 Withheld results

22.3.1 Pursuant to s4.4 of *Examination Regulations*, a Chief Examiner in a unit may withhold a result until satisfied by further assessment whether the student has passed. Such result shall not be withheld for longer than nine months from the date of the meeting of the relevant Board of Examiners without the written consent of the Associate Dean (Undergraduate Studies).
